I'll Never Look At You As "Less Than" So That You Can Forever See the "More Than" of Yourself

Raymond J. Golarz, Ph.D. For almost twenty years, Dr. Raymond J. Golarz has directed work with at-risk children and delinquent gang members near Chicago and worked extensively with juvenile courts, probation offices and police departments. For approximately five years he taught law enforce-



ment officers in and around Chicago regarding the psychology of delinquency and deviant behavior. During his career he has served as an elementary and secondary school teacher, administrator at various levels including superintendent, and teacher at Indiana University, Purdue University and City University in Seattle. He is co-author of *Restructuring Schools for Excellence through Teacher Empowerment* and *The Power of Participation.* In addition, he is the author of *Transformational Leadership in the Learning Organization.* Dr. Golarz is noted for his humor, inspiration and insights.

Dr. Golarz is highly recommended by early childhood educators. His keynote and breakout session will be of interest to educators and families focusing upon the belief system of adults and society and the impact those beliefs have upon children throughout their lives. If children are to be successful, they and we must believe that they can be successful. His hope is to touch the affective domain of the participants.

Professor Berkson is considered one of the country's leading authorities in the field of creative thinking, and is the author of *The Different Drummer Handbook, Marching to the Creative Beat.*

Denis, who is a father of a child with Cerebral Palsy, has worked with organizations serving people with special needs. He has done programs for groups such as Pathways Center for Children, and appeared with his family in videos such as: "Is My Baby OK?" and a how-to video on computer usage for children with challenges. Denis is a self-decreed spokesman for the power and potential of individuals who are challenged.

Contegrity—Why We Do What We Do, The Way We Do It, and How We Know We Did It.

Judy Harris Helm, Ed.D. Best Practices, Inc. Are children engaged in their learning? Is time well spent in the classroom? Are professionals doing more assessing than teaching? Are children learning what they need to



learn? How do you know? "Contegrity – Why We Do What We Do, The Way We Do It, and How We Know We Did It" introduces the concept of contegrity... the art of teaching with continuity and integrity in the classroom. With children's work and anecdotes from real classrooms, Dr. Helm challenges professionals to stop and think where they put their efforts and how they spend children's precious time. Are teachers doing the job for children and families? Friday's general session looks at engaged learning, curriculum and assessment in the classroom.

Judy Harris Helm, Ed.D. is Associate Professor of Early Childhood Education at National-Louis University in Evanston, Illinois. She began her career teaching first grade then taught, directed, and designed early childhood and primary programs as well as trained teachers at the community college, undergraduate, and graduate levels. She served on the Task Force for the design of the Valeska Hinton Early Childhood Education Center, a state of the art urban collaboration school for children age three through first grade in Peoria, Illinois, where she became Professional Development Coordinator for the school. Dr. Helm is coauthor of *Windows on Learning: Documenting Children's Work, and Teacher Materials for Documenting Children's Work,* and *Young Investigators: The Project Approach in the Early Years.*

Marrea Winnega, Ph.D., Clinical Psychologist Mary Coughlin, MS CCC-SLP, Speech/Language Pathologist A.E.R.O. Special Education Cooperative

A multi-modal approach has been found to be successful in teaching students with autism. The audience will learn about two effective strategies – TEACCH and Discrete Trial – for teaching young students with autism. Learning characteristics of children with autism will be described. The use of these strategies is a foundation for students with autism to learn a variety of skills.

Kathy Barclay, Ph.D., Chair, Department of Curriculum and Instruction Western Illinois University, Macomb

Early childhood teachers, caregivers, and parents can make all the difference in the world when it comes to helping young children develop into readers and writers. In this session, we'll look at research-based strategies for promoting: (1) oral language and phonological awareness, (2) concepts about print, books and stories, and (3) written language development.

The Project Approach and the Illinois Learning Standards (3-8)

Sallee Beneke, M.Ed., Professor Illinois Valley Community College

This presentation will explain the Project Approach and will provide practical answers to commonly perceived obstacles in implementing the Project Approach, including scheduling, meeting the Illinois Early Learning Standards, children with limited experiences, inclusion, and part-day programs. Many examples from projects in classrooms for children 3-8 will be shared.

Integrating Art into the Early Childhood Curriculum: Nudging and Nurturing the Creative Spirit (3-5)

Darlene Crampton-Fahrenkrog, Ph.D., Professor of Art, Concordia University, River Forest This presentation will focus on developmentally appropriate activities, methods and materials that support individual creative expression.

Everyday Heroes: Working with Children with Traumatic Brain Injury (0-8)

Sharon Gage, Parent Resource Specialist, StarNet Region IV Lynette Gage, Student

Lynette Gage received a traumatic brain injury at age 10 and was in a coma for nearly three months. She will present a first-person perspective of TBI and special thanks to those who touch the lives of people with disabilities and inspire them to higher levels of personal achievement. Participants will receive an overview of traumatic brain injury to include information for writing functional and effective education plans and dealing with challenging behaviors. Participants will learn the importance of parents and professionals working together to identify and develop strategies for home and classroom to meet the unique needs of the child with TBI.

The ABCs of Storytelling (Storytelling 101) (0-8)

Linda Gorham, Story Teller

Storytelling is the art of verbally, physically and imaginatively revealing a story to an audience. People tell stories all the time. They have fond memories of sitting around the kitchen table sharing stories. And it is amazing how those stories repeated over and over again bring back such good, warm (and sometimes crazy) memories. Storytelling is an art on the rise. More and more people are interested in sharing memories, and passing along the values learned through stories. And anyone can tell a good story. Really! To tell a story simply takes a little imagination, some knowledge of the basics, and a willingness to try. It's a viable option for everyone, if they just explore the possibilities and learn the A, B, C's. This workshop will be a combination of lecture and story plus group exercises.

Understanding Difficult Behavior: Why Does He Do That? (3-5)

Becky Handler, SLP, and Nancy Pufahl, Resource Specialists, StarNet Region VI

How can we begin to READ messages children's misbehavior may be communicating? Behavior is complex and is influenced by many factors. During this informative session, participants will be made aware of 3 messages commonly conveyed by children's misbehavior. This discussion will demonstrate that when we see repeated misbehavior, we need to realize that the behavior has meaning and serves a function for the child.

Getting to Know You: Birth-3 and 3-5 Transition (0-5)

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act calls for a "smooth and effective transition" from Part C (birth-3 year olds) services in natural environments to Part B (3-5 year olds) services in the community. This outcome requires family participation, local administrative networking, organization, and collaboration. This workshop will provide an opportunity to learn of the various roles individuals have in the transition process under state and federal expectations.

Motor Development in the Young Child (0-8)

Sue Kirchgessner, PT, MS, Consultant Participants will learn about typical and atypical motor skill development from infancy through early childhood. Activities, strategies and adaptations that enhance and support motor skill development for all children will be shared.

"Wow, Look What These Kids Can Do!" (0-3)

This fun interactive session involving group discussion and small group activities will look at the amazing world of infant/toddler development. Areas of development addressed will include emotional, cognitive, motor, language, and adaptive.

DEC Recommended Practices in Early Intervention/Early Childhood Special Education (0-5)

Understanding Speech and Language Delays in Children 0-8 (0-8)

Debra Reichert Hoge, Ed.D., Professor Department of Special Education and Communication Disorders Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville

During this session, participants will identify the differences between speech and language as they investigate typical development and the specific areas in which delays can occur.

In the Business of Growing Brains: Infant Brain Development (0-5)

Collaboration is Like ... (0-8)

Legal guidelines as well as best practice applications will be reviewed.

Making the Switch from Traditional to Play Based Screening or Stepping Out of The Darkness and Into The Light (3-5)

Sharon Winnett, MS/SLP, Early Childhood Programs Coordinator, Hillsboro Community Unit Dist. #3 Kim Draper, MS/SLP, Speech-Language Pathologist. Hillsboro Pre-Kindergarten Program

The presenters will take the attendees on a brief trip back through time to what they consider to be the "Dark Days" of their district's screening of young children using traditional screening instruments. They will move participants along through their discovering what is right for young children and the committing to change, which brought their district into the "Light" of using the children's natural affinity for play as the medium for screening. Participants will be given information and materials to go back to their districts to begin making the changes necessary to move to a more appropriate, child and family-friendly screening process.

Participants will learn about the practices and beliefs of teachers who are currently teaching in inclusive settings and gain insight into necessary elements for it to succeed.

Learning from Reggio's Approach to Inclusion: An Outstanding Education for All Children (0-8)

Tess Bennett, Ph.D., Director, Great Lakes Quality Improvement Center for Disabilities (QIC-D), University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign

This presentation will introduce participants to Reggio Emilia's outstanding system of care and education for young children. Key principles and strategies for inclusion will be discussed based on Reggio beliefs about how children learn. Attendees will learn first steps in using Reggio Emilia as a model for inclusion.

Shift Happens: Resources for Infusing New Content and Capabilities in Teaching/Training Practices (0-8)

Implementing these standards and corresponding quality indicators provide a foundation to support children's future growth and development and physical, emotional, social and cognitive well-being, leading to successful learning for each child.

Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ): Parent Completed Child Monitoring System (0-5)

Lynn R. Liston, Ed.D, Coordinator for Pediatric Specialty Services Rockford Memorial Hospital

This workshop will present general information about screening and assessment, including the components of a screening program, factors to consider when reviewing screening information, the requirements of IDEA, and how the use of the ASQ can enhance Child Find efforts. Information regarding the rationale behind the development of the ASQ system, the accuracy of parent report, and cultural sensitivity and flexibility of the tool will be presented. Participants will practice scoring and view a video illustrating the use of the ASQ in a home.



Effective Behavior Management (0-8)






