In addition, he is the author of Transformational Leadership in the Learning Organization. Dr. Golarz is noted for his humor, inspiration and insights.

Contegrity—Why We Do What We Do, The Way We Do It, and How We Know We Did It.

Judy Harris Helm, Ed.D., Best Practices, Inc. Are children engaged in their learning? Is time well spent in the classroom? Are professionals doing more assessing than teaching? Are children learning what they need to



learn? How do you know? "Contegrity – Why We Do What We Do, The Way We Do It, and How We Know We Did It" introduces the concept of contegrity . . . the art of teaching with continuity and integrity in the classroom. She served on the Task Force for the design of the Valeska Hinton Early Childhood Education Center, a state of the art urban collaboration school for children age three through first grade in Peoria, Illinois, where she became Professional Development Coordinator for the school. Dr. Helm is co-author of Windows on Learning: Documenting Children's Work, Teacher Materials for Documenting Children's Work, and Young Investigators: The Project Approach in the Early Years.

The ABCs of Storytelling: Storytelling 101 (Birth-8)

Storytelling is the art of verbally, physically and imaginatively revealing a story to an audience. People tell stories all the time. They have fond memories of sitting around the kitchen table sharing stories. It is amazing how those stories repeated over and over again bring back such good, warm (and sometimes crazy) memories. Storytelling is an art on the rise. More and more people are interested in sharing memories, and passing along the values learned through stories. Anyone can tell a good story. Really! Telling a story simply takes a little imagination, some knowledge of the basics, and a willingness to try. It's a viable option for everyone, if they just explore the possibilities and learn the A, B, C's. This workshop will be a combination of lecture and story plus group exercises.

Understanding Difficult Behavior: Why Does He Do That? (3-5)

How can we begin to READ the messages children's misbehavior may be communicating? Behavior is complex and is influenced by many factors. Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ): Parent Completed Child Monitoring System (Birth-5)

This workshop will present general information about screening and assessment, including the components of a screening program, factors to consider when reviewing screening information, the requirements of IDEA, and how the use of the ASQ can enhance Child Find efforts. Information regarding the development of the ASQ system, the accuracy of parent report, and cultural sensitivity and flexibility of the tool will be presented. Participants will practice scoring and view a video illustrating the use of the ASQ in a home.

Effective Behavior Management (Birth-8)

address the impact of cultural and linguistic diversity; and (c) the effectiveness of materials that have been translated from one language to another. This session describes practices to identify and review materials and practices for their cultural and linguistic relevance. A framework is provided for personnel to use to enhance the cultural and linguistic appropriateness of services for young children with disabilities and their families.



Developmental Continuity in Early Childhood: Vicissitudes & Victories (Birth-8)

Susan W. Nall, Ph.D., Professor and Director of Early Childhood Education, Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville

How is the Early Childhood Profession addressing continuity? How are we collaborating from birth through the primary grades? How are we incorporating the Illinois Learning Standards into our programs and articulating the curriculum vertically and horizontally? Continuity is the heart of the early childhood profession as it moves forward in the 21st century. Hear about the vicissitudes & victories from several districts.

Not Quite Right: Understanding Disorders of Regulation (Birth-5)

Jennifer Rosinia, M.Ed., OTR/I, KidsLinks Unlimited, Inc.

Most children develop internal control or regulation within the first few months of life. If a child has not yet mastered the ability to self calm, has difficulty with sleeping, is intolerant to change, and appears to be in a hyperalert state then the child may have a regulatory disorder. In this workshop, regulatory disorder will be defined and outcomes of such disorders on later development will be discussed and assessment and treatment of regulatory disorders in young children will be highlighted.

UCP Chicago's First Tech Touch — Repeat Session (Birth-5)

UCP Chicago's First Tech Touch Program introduces technology to young children (9 months and older) of all abilities, their parents, and service providers. Bringing Books Alive (3-5)

excited about books. Presenters will demonstrate many styles and ways

well as how they can become topics for project learning.

Building a Transdisciplinary Team (3-5)

Catherine Stanton, Early Childhood Education Teacher Kimberly Miller, Speech/Language Pathologist Linda Brannigan, Physical Therapy Assistant Rosemarie Arakelian, Occupational Therapist Assistant
This session will focus on the process of developing a special education service model that incorporates the support services of speech, occupational and physical therapy within the natural context of the early childhood classroom. The team consists of an early childhood education teacher, a speech/language pathologist, an occupational therapist and a physical therapist from Cook County School District #130, which is a demographically diverse school district in the southern suburbs of Chicago. The team will describe the successes and challenges of their experience, which began seven years ago with a vision of incorporating a transdisciplinary model in their school.

The Most Awesome Professional Development . . . National Board Teacher Certification (3-8)

Cheri Stewart, Teacher; Char Knudten, Teacher; Lee County Special Education Association
This session will introduce participants to the National Board for
Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) certification process.
Participants will receive information about certification areas, national
teaching standards, portfolio requirements, assessment center expectations, and the application process in Illinois.

Autism 101 (Birth-8)

Sandy Valentine, Resource Specialist, StarNet Regions I and III Anyone working with young children with autism and their families will benefit from attending this workshop. Participants will learn to understand the young child diagnosed with autistic spectrum disorder. The session focuses on strategies to help the child with autism be successful at home and in the classroom, with the use of simple, inexpensive learning materials. Resources will be offered.

The Effects of Incarceration on Family and Community (Birth-8)

The increasing use of incarceration as a response to social problems such as addiction, poverty, and lack of education has affected millions of children. This workshop will provide information about the effects of parental incarceration on young children and discuss strategies for helping children whose lives are disrupted by the arrest or incarceration of a parent.

The Social and Emotional Environment in Early Childhood Settings (Birth-5)

Eileen T. Borgia, Ph.D., Assistant Professor,
Early Childhood Education, Illinois State University, Normal
Carol Weisheit, MA., Executive Director,
Illinois Coalition Against Sexual Assault
Participants will analyze features in early childhood environments that
promote social and emotional development and competence. Topics
will include an overview of research indicating that environmental fea-

tures such as adult-child and child-child interactions, ambiance, timing

and pacing, and attachment and separation have a significant influence on the emotional health of young children.

Embedding Assessment into the Regular Routines of an Inclusive Environment (3-5)

Rebecca J. Cook, Ph.D., Associate Professor, Eastern Illinois University This session will focus on a naturalistic assessment process involving the reorganization of items on a criterion reference tool so assessment can be conducted during routines of the day and through fun, game-oriented activities. Participants will learn how to reorganize assessment tools according to their schedules and the presenter will demonstrate assessment activities.

Beyond the Easel and Brush (Birth-5)

Ann Curtis, MA, Teacher/Director Western Illinois University Infant & Preschool

This workshop will review the four stages of evolving children's art which will lead into a discussion of the importance of open ended, process oriented art projects as well as skills children learn through art experiences. The presenter will share examples of art projects that have been enjoyed at the WIU center. How children's literature can be a stepping stone for many art experiences will be discussed and examples of class made bulletin boards relating to specific poems or stories will be shared.

Inclusion: Best Practices (3-8)

Charlotte Denight, BS, Consultant/Trainer H.E.A.R. – Highlighting Education and Resources Barbara Fiedler, Ed.D. Assistant Professor of Special Education Illinois State University

This session is designed to address various concerns regarding the inclusion of students who are deaf or hard of hearing. The main focus is on ways to adapt the environment including barriers and solutions for inclusion, critical supports and resources related to inclusion, legal considerations, and parent participation. Assistive technology used in the home and in the classroom will be on display.

Frazzled Francine & Stressed Out Stefan (Birth-8)

Elizabeth Frisbie, MA, Ms.Ed., EC Consultant/Behavior Specialist

Education for Change Divorcing parents, illness, abuse, no friends . . . Are students under a lot of stress? This session will identify the warning signs of stress overload in children and show teachers how they may help students reduce stress levels and relax. The impact of chronic stress on brain, cognitive and social-emotional development will also be discussed as will instructional modifications and behavior management techniques recommended for stressed children.



How to Grow a Strong Child: "Wrap" Them While They're Young! (3-8)

Vernessa Gipson, MSW, Regional Coordinator, ISBE EBD Network Cassandra Baker, Director, FANS (Families Accessing Networks and Support), East Central Chapter-Federation of Families for Children's Mental Health

Many children with emotional and behavioral disabilities, both diagnosed and suspected, and their families frequently have unmet needs that are across many life domains. This workshop is designed to provide participants with a general understanding of the Wraparound philosophy and process that can be used in assisting families in identifying their strengths, their needs and appropriate resources. The Wraparound process is based on individualized, needs driven planning and services. It is not a program or a type of service. It is a value base and an unconditional commitment to create services on a "one kid at a time" basis to support normalized and inclusive options for students with complex needs and their families.

Reading, Rainsticks, and Recipes (3-8)

Anne Golden, BA, Director; Kaylee Johnson, Assistant Director Bright Futures Resource Center

Play is a child's work. It is our role as parents and educators to provide materials and an environment that can stimulate creative thinking. Participants will have an opportunity to create sample books, toys, and musical instruments that can be used by children ages 3-8 in their play, and by the adults who work with them. Try some recipes and take away samples and experiences from the session to share with your children and staff.

Augmentative Communication Systems for Young Children with Autism (Birth-8)



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


