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What We Know from Research about Sharing Informational Books with Young Children

"When parents read informational books to their children, the book discussion talk of both parents and children contained more comments and greater vocabulary diversity."

-Price, vanKleeck, and Huberty (2009)

Children learn language from information book read alouds

- Expose children to language at higher levels of cognitive demand.
- Frequent repetition of the topical theme.
- Timeless verbs (e.g., "Ants carry sand," as opposed to Ants carried sand.")
- Specialized vocabulary (thorax, colony).
- Description of attributes/components (e.g., "Ants have six legs").

Children learn content from informational book read alouds

- The vocabulary diversity in information books is greater than in storybooks.
- When parents and children share books that include features of print, such as speech balloons, labels within pictures, and/or letters or words in isolation or highlighted using color, size, and font:
 - children were much more likely to focus their gaze on them, or to gaze longer at the illustrations that included them.
 - children made offered more print-related comments and questions.

Young children enjoy reading nonfiction texts.

- Young children often choose nonfiction texts on their own.
- Both boys and girls at make choices that include nonfiction.

Benefits of Reading Informational Books Aloud to Students Include...

- Developing students' familiarity with the sound of informational text, which positively affects their later writing abilities.
- ✓ Increasing students' background knowledge and vocabulary.
- ✓ Increasing students' comprehension.
- ✓ Fostering students' critical thinking skills as they compare and contrast information from books on the same topic.
- ✓ Sparking curiosity and desire to learn about the world.
- ✓ Helping students identify with people different from themselves.

Using Informational Text with Young Children

• Prepare children for the read aloud experience

- Tap into children's background knowledge about the topic
- Preview text
- Set a purpose for reading

• Guide children's listening

- Help children learn how informational books are read
 - Recognize and utilize text features
 - Determine important ideas
 - Use pictures
- Help children build understanding while you read
 - Teach and reinforce meanings of new words
 - Connect text to self
 - Make and confirm predictions
 - Visualize
 - Ask questions
 - Give and support opinions
 - Draw and support conclusions
 - Determine cause and effect
 - Distinguish between fantasy and fact

Facilitate connections

- Use the text to make interdisciplinary connections
 - Engage in shared and independent writing and drawing experiences
 - Use technology to discover and share information
 - Read additional texts, comparing and contrasting information in each
 - Pair fiction and nonfiction
 - Explore related knowledge and concepts in science, social studies, math, etc.
 - Link to art, music, movement and/or drama
